We are asking students to have a novel of their choice sent to school for quiet reading times. They can bring one from home or the library. We want to work on improving our reading skills over then next few months!


IMPORTANT REMINDERS

WHAT ARE WE LEARNING

Language Arts:

- Accessing information and ideas from a variety of sources and from prior_knowledge to build a
 greater understanding
- Using a variety of comprehension skills before, during, and after reading, listening, or viewing to guide inquiry to deepen understanding
- · Transform ideas and information to create original texts
- Using paragraphs and applying conventions of Canadian spelling, grammar, and punctuation to writing

Socials:

- Ask questions, corroborate inferences, and draw conclusions about the content and origins of a variety of sources, including mass media (evidence)
- Differentiate between intended and unintended consequences of events, decisions, developments and speculate about alternative outcomes
- Make ethical judgements about events, decisions, or actions that consider the conditions of a particular time and place and assess appropriate ways to respond

Art:

- Express, feelings, ideas, and experiences through the arts
- · Experience and present creative works in a variety of ways
- Develop processes and technical skills in a variety of art forms

Science:

- · Make predictions about a findings of an inquiry
- Observe, measure and record data, using appropriate tools
- Choose appropriate data to collet to answer questions

Math:

• Students are focusing this week on rounding. We will then begin our study of multiplication. All students should be practicing their times tables each night. Different ways to study have been shared in class.

Careers:

• Our focus will be on what is a habit and how habits are formed. This will lead to goal setting and how we can achieve our goals by forming good habits.
